

AARTI BETIGERI is a Canberra-based writer and former former foreign correspondent, who spent almost a decade based in South Asia. She is a correspondent for Monocle, a columnist with the Lowy Institute's The Interpreter, and editor of the forthcoming 'Growing Up Indian In Australia' anthology, part of the Growing Up series published by Black Inc (out in July 2024). Her work has appeared in the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal, Newsweek, Time, the Christian Science Monitor, Public Radio International and others. She has interviewed three world leaders and worked on major investigative journalism initiatives. She has also worked as a television news journalist and presenter with ABC and SBS.

AHMAD SHUJA JAMAL is a Special Advisor to the Refugee Council of Australia. A former Afghan civil servant now in exile, Shuja served as the director-general for international relations and regional cooperation at the Afghan National Security Council, where he helped manage Afghanistan's security partnerships. He also served as director for peace and civilian protection and handled Afghanistan's policy portfolio on international sanctions, including those of the UN Security Council and the US against Taliban, Al-Qaeda, and ISIS.

ALAN FINKEL was Australia's chief scientist from 2016 to 2020. He is a neuroscientist, engineer and entrepreneur. He led the 2017 National Electricity Market Review and the 2019 development of the National Hydrogen Strategy, and chaired the 2020 panel developing the Low Emissions Technology Roadmap. He is currently special adviser to the Australian government on low-emissions technologies. His latest book is Powering Up.

ALICE GRUNDY has been a book editor for the past fifteen years and is completing a PhD at ANU. Her thesis is the basis for a minigraph, *Editing Fiction: Three cases studies from postwar Australia* published by Cambridge University Press and her reviews and essays have appeared in the Sydney Review of Books, The Conversation and The Canberra Times.

Her fiction has been translated into French and her short stories have appeared in international publications including Antipodes and New Writing. Alison is Emeritus Professor at the Australian National University, a Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences in Australia, a Fellow of the Econometric Society, and recipient of the ESA Distinguished Fellow Award.

ALISTAIR OTT (They/He) is a Wiradjuri Queer artist. Born on Gundungurra and raised on Ngunnawal Land, they were taught Dreamtime stories and their family's language and culture from their Ngama and Mudyigang. These stories, his time on country with mob and family, and his queer community inspire his writing; these are the spaces where his spirit resides. When they aren't writing, Alistair spends their time working in LGBTIQA+ community services and on their PhD at the Australian National University. He hopes to continue writing stories that spark joy for gueer blakfullas like himself. Dyiramadilinya badhu Wiradjuri!

ALLAN BEHM specialises in political and security risk evaluation, policy analysis and development, and negotiating the policy/politics interface. Following a career spanning nearly thirty years in the Australian Public Service, he was Chief of Staff to Greg Combet, from 2019 to 2013. And from March 2017 until February 2019 he was senior advisor to the Shadow Minister for Foreign Affairs, Senator Penny Wong. He has a significant publishing record in academic and professional journals, and is a respected commentator in both the electronic and print media. His book No, Minister – an insider's account of the what actually goes on in Parliament House – was published by Melbourne University Publishing in 2015.

BEEJAY SILCOX is a literary critic and the Artistic Director of Canberra Writers Festival.

BIFF WARD A founding member of Canberra Women's Liberation, has been an antiwar activist, feminist activist and adult educator in human communication and harassment prevention. Author of Father-Daughter Rape (The Women's Press, 1984), one of the first books in the world about child sexual abuse; In My Mothers Hands (2014), a memoir about growing up with a mother living with schizophrenia which was short listed for major awards; and *The Third Chopstick* (2022) a memoir about the Vietnam war.

BRENDAN WATKINS learned he was adopted at eight years of age. He discovered his birth mother had been a Catholic nun at thirty. A DNA test at sixty revealed his father was a celebrated Catholic priest. In late 2018, after a diverse career in the entertainment and not-for-profit sectors, he resigned from his job to investigate and record his story. DR CAITLIN MAHAR lectures in history at Swinburne University of Technology. She completed a PhD in history at the University of Melbourne in 2016 and was awarded the Society for the Social History of Medicine Roy Porter Essay Prize, the Australian and New Zealand Society for the History of Medicine Ben Haneman Memorial Award and the University of Melbourne's Dennis-Wettenhall Prize. She previously taught literature and was a restaurant critic for Fairfax Media Publications.

CATHY EATOCK is a Gayiri/Badtjula woman, with traditional ties to the lands of central Queensland, Australia. Cathy is a PhD Candidate at the University of Sydney where her thesis is considering the capacity of the United Nations to support the recognition of Indigenous rights. Cathy is the elected Co-Chair of the Indigenous Peoples' Organisation-Australia (IPO), a national coalition of First Nations peoples committed to advocating for the rights of Indigenous peoples. Cathy is also the elected Pacific Representative to the Facilitative Working Group of the Local Communities and Indigenous Peoples Platform for the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change.

CHARLOTTE WOOD is the prizewinning author of six novels and three books of non-fiction. Her latest book is The Luminous Solution, a book about creativity and the inner life. Her seventh novel, Stone Yard Devotional, will be published in October 2023.

CHRIS MASTERS PSM is a powerful force in Australian journalism. A multi Walkley Award winner, his reports 'The Big League' and 'The Moonlight State' both led to royal commissions that helped transform the nation. He spent extended periods with Australian forces in Afghanistan, and he is the author of the bestselling Jonestown, Uncommon Soldier and No Front Line.

PROFESSOR CLARE WRIGHT OAM is an award-winning historian, author, broadcaster and public commentator. Clare is currently Professor of History and Professor of Public Engagement at La Trobe University. She is the author of four works of history, including the bestselling *The Forgotten Rebels of Eureka* and *You Daughters* of Freedom, which comprise the first two instalments of her Democracy Trilogy. DEIRDRE MACKEN is a journalist who has worked for The Age, SMH and Financial Review and is currently a columnist with The Australian's Review section. She has written two previous books and is still working in a vineyard and renovating a fibro cottage.

Political historian **DR CHRIS WALLACE** is a professor at the University of Canberra, and the author of *Political Lives:* Australian prime ministers and their biographers. Her previous book, *How To Win An Election*, drew important lessons for Labor from its shock 2019 election loss. Wallace was formerly a longstanding member of the Canberra Press Gallery, and her political analysis and commentary currently appears in Nikkei Asia, The Sydney Morning Herald, The Age, The Saturday Paper and The Conversation.

Bad Art Mother was shortlisted for the 2023 Stella Prize and the 2023 NSW Premier's Literary Awards (Christina Stead Prize for Fiction).

ELIZABETH CHONG AM is one of the most loved and enduring personalities within the Australian food industry. She is dedicated to breaking down the barriers between those of different cultural backgrounds, and ensuring the intricacies of Chinese Cuisine are understood and appreciated by everyone. Through extensive writing, travelling, touring and TV appearances she conveys her message in an honest, energetic and eloquent manner. Elizabeth is currently working on her memoir.

ELIZABETH REID was Adviser on matters relating to the welfare of women and children to E. G. Whitlam, the Australian Prime Minister from 1972 to 1975. She has contributed a chapter to the collection, Whitlam and Women: Revisiting the Revolution (2023), edited by Michelle Arrow. She subsequently worked internationally on matters related to gender, the HIV epidemic, and development.

ELLEN VAN NEERVEN is an award-winning writer of Mununjali and Dutch heritage. Ellen's first book, Heat and *Light*, was the recipient of the David Unaipon Award, the Dobbie Literary Award and the NSW Premier's Literary Awards Indigenous Writers Prize. They have written two poetry collections: *Comfort Food*, which was shortlisted for two awards, and *Throat*, which won the Kenneth Slessor Prize for Poetry and the Multicultural NSW Award and Book of the Year in the NSW Premier's Literary Awards.

ELOISE GRILLS is an award-winning writer, comics artist, poet and critic. Her work has been published widely in literary journals and anthologies including Meanjin, The Saturday Paper, The Rumpus, Going Down Swinging, Kill Your Darlings, Sydney Review of Books, The Lifted Brow and Borderless. Eloise lives on Dja Dja Wurrung country with her fiancé Jackie, and their two dogs, Ripley and Vince, as well as her motherin-law, Madeleine, and her dog, Minnie. big beautiful female theory is her first collection of essays, which was shortlisted for the Stella Prize.

ELSPETH PITT is Senior Curator, Australian Art, at the National Gallery of Australia, Kamberri/Canberra.

EMMA MACDONALD OAM is a multi-award winning journalist, speaker and maternal health advocate. In the Queen's Birthday Honours list in 2022 Emma was awarded a Medal of the Order of Australia for services to journalism and women. Emma has been writing about Canberra and its people for nearly three decades, winning numerous awards for her journalism - including a Walkley or two - along the way. Canberra born and bred, she's fiercely loyal to the city, tribally inner-north, and grateful to tell stories for a living.

EMMA SHORTIS is a historian, writer and commentator focused on the history and politics of the United States. Her first book, Our Exceptional Friend: Australia's Fatal Alliance with the United States, was published in 2021. Emma is a Lecturer in the Social and Global Studies Centre at RMIT University. Before that, she was a Fox-Zucker International Fellow at Yale University.

ESTHER ANATOLITIS, Editor of Meanjin, is one of Australia's most impactful advocates for arts and culture. She is Hon A/Prof at RMIT School of Art and a member of the National Gallery of Australia Governing Council. Across two decades Esther has led arts and media organisations across all artforms, including Craft Victoria and the National Association for the Visual Arts. Esther regularly facilitates strategic, creative and political conversations, and is a prolific writer, critic and commentator. Most recently her work has appeared in the Guardian and Crikey, and her book Place, Practice, Politics was published in 2022.

EVELYN ARALUEN is a poet, researcher and co-editor of Overland Literary Journal. Her widely published criticism, fiction and poetry has been awarded the Nakata Brophy Prize for Young Indigenous Writers, the Judith Wright Poetry Prize, a Wheeler Centre Next Chapter Fellowship, and a Neilma Sidney Literary Travel Fund grant. Evelyn's debut collection Dropbear was shortlisted for the 2021 Judith Wright Calanthe Award for a Poetry Collection and the 2022 Kenneth Slessor Prize for Poetry, and won the 2022 Stella Prize. It was Highly Commended for the 2021 Anne Elder Award.

FRANK BONGIORNO is a Canberra-based historian who teaches at the Australian National University. He is also a Distinguished Fellow of the Whitlam Institute at Western Sydney University and President of the Australian Historical Association.

FRAN KELLY is one of Australia's leading interviewers and commentators. She has earned a reputation as an intelligent, informed and balanced journalist who has been a key contributor to the nation's political, social and cultural debates for the past 25 years. In that time she's been the ABC's Europe Correspondent based in London, the political editor for The 7.30 Report and the political correspondent for the prestigious AM program. Fran was the host of ABC RN Breakfast, Australia's leading national current affairs radio show, for 17 years. She also hosted her own Friday night TV chat show, Frankly. She's also co- host of the long running political podcast. The Party Room.

FRED SMITH writes songs. Some of them are sad. Some of them are funny. Some of them are sad and funny. Some of them are quite serious. They have melodies and stories you can remember - that stay with you and keep you company. Fred's songs reflect the world he has seen in what, so far, has been a messy and interesting life. He was the subject of an Australian Story documentary feature about his experiences in Afghanistan and Bougainville. His book, The Dust of Uruzgan, was published by Allen and Unwin.

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GABRIELLE JACKSON is the associate editor for audio and visual at Guardian Australia. She is the author of *Pain and Prejudice: How the Medical System Ignores Women – and* What We Can Do About It, and won the 2016 Medicinewise award for excellence in media reporting for her work covering endometriosis. She also sits on the Walkleys Judging Board.

GAIL RADFORD spent more than twenty years working in senior positions in public services in Australia and overseas. Gail became interested in Women's Liberation and the Civil Rights movement while studying in North America. On her return to Australia she joined Women's Liberation and was a founding member of the Women's Electoral Lobby (WEL). Her involvement in feminist politics resulted in her joining the public service to introduce EEO programs for women and minority group members; programs that she shaped and led throughout Australia for the next 15 years.

GENEVIEVE JACOBS AM has been a journalist for 30 years, working in print and radio. She sits on the Cultural Facilities Corporation board and chairs the Canberra International Music Festival. Genevieve was the inaugural chair of the arts minister's Creative Council, and inaugural co-chair of the Reconciliation Council. Genevieve has an enduring interest in building community, and creating discussions that include us all. And she still loves nothing better than a good yarn.

GILLIAN (GILL) APPLETON is a writer and researcher who has been involved in the women's movement since the late 1960s. In 2016 he was appointed to the Referendum Council on Indigenous recognition. Stan is now Professor of Global Affairs at Griffith University and International Affairs Analyst at ABC.

STEPH LENTZ is a former advertising writer and secondary school teacher. She came to public attention in 2021 after she was sacked from her job as a teacher because of her sexuality. Steph is based in Sydney.



OM DHUNGEL IN CONVERSATION WITH FRAN KELLY

"I lost my possessions, my salary, my status, my career, my country. And in that fall, I gained everything." Bhutan is known as the land of Gross National Happiness, a Buddhist Shangri-la hidden in the Himalayas. But in the late 1980s, Bhutan waged a brutal ethnic-cleansing campaign against its citizens of Nepali ancestry, including Om Dhungel and his family.

Bhutan to Blacktown tells Om Dhungel's remarkable story — his journey from a remote village to a senior position in the Bhutanese Civil Service, to life as a human rights activist in Nepal and, eventually, to his work as a community leader in Blacktown, western Sydney. Every step prepared Om for the central role he would play in settling more than 5000 Bhutanese refugees, in one of the most successful refugee initiatives in Australia's history.
